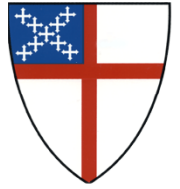

226th Annual Diocesan Convention Quilt Task Force

Each church was sent a 11X11" piece of muslin material to create a block representing their parish. These quilts will show the inclusion of all the congregations which compose the wonderful, diverse Diocese of New Jersey.

To help celebrate the 225th Anniversary of the Diocese of New Jersey, there will be eight quilts representing the convocations in the diocese. Each quilt will be comprised of panels depicting the congregations in that convocation. The eight quilts will hang in the convention hall throughout the two-day convention. After the convention, the convocations will house and use the quilts as needed throughout the year and make them available to hang at every convention. Good Shepherd's contribution was from a committee consisting of Mother Pat, Ellie Dunn, Sister Kara Anderson, and Shelly Harris.

The crewel stitchery of Jesus as the Good Shepherd as well as the welcoming hands were created by the talented Ellie. Endowment Fund

After an informative and educational meeting with **Mr. Ken Quigley** of the Episcopal Church Foundation, the Vestry, at it's July 2010 meeting, adopted

an "Enabling Resolution Establishing a General Endowment Fund". The adopted Enabling Resolution also established an Endowment Fund Board, which is the custodian of the Endowment Fund. the purpose of the Endowment Fund is to "enable the parish to more completely fulfill its mission by developing its ministries beyond what is possible through its annual operating funds, and therefore distributions from the fund shall be limited to (i) maintenance and support of the physical plant of the parish, (ii) outreach ministries and grants, (iii) seed money for new ministries and special one-time projects, and (iv) such other purposes as are specifically designated by donors to the parish whose gifts are included in the fund".

The Enabling Resolution also established a "Plan of Operation" for the Endowment Fund Board, which includes, *inter alia*, Composition of the Board, Officers and Duties of the Board, Holding of Assets, Acceptance of Gifts, Distributions from the Fund, etc.

The entire original of the entire Enabling Resolution is on file in the Parish Office and may be viewed by any Parish member.

The Vestry is seeking applicants to sit as members of the Endowment Fund Board.

The Episcopal Church Foundation, which oversees and assists with endowment fund investments throughout the United States, will be assisting our Endowment Fund Board, and will be providing educational and informational brochures and pamphlets to the Parish in the near future for distribution to Parish members.

A Columbarium for Church of the Good Shepherd

“What is a Columbarium?” I asked, when first approached for the task of chairing this committee. I soon learned that it is a vault with niches that contain the ashes of cremated bodies. Over the last few months I have grown to love the concept for what it offers to our church members and for its true beauty.

From the earliest times Christians have buried their dead in crypts, churchyards and inside the church. What better place than in the church to place the remains of a loved one. It is where we are baptized and it is where we give our life to Christ. If the church congregation is one’s center of life through baptism, Holy Communion, confirmation and marriage, then death and burial are also an integral part in completing that cycle.

The number of Christians who are being cremated rather than buried or placed in a mausoleum is ever increasing. Often the question is asked, “What do we do with the cremated remains of our loved one?” Fortunately there is a dignified option that is consistent with Christian tradition. From earliest times, Christians have buried their dead in their church. Typically this honor was reserved for kings, heroes or other notables. The columbarium now allows us to properly honor our dead by placing their remains in our church. Several churches in our area now have columbariums and they are growing in popularity all over this country.

The committee is in the very early stage of looking at columbariums offered by different companies and determining the best placement for one. When a design and placement are chosen, we will begin to accept reservations for niches. We do not know at this point how much a niche will cost, but it will be an option that is significantly less than a traditional burial.

One of the most common questions asked is how much is this going to cost the church? In our planning, we have determined that we will be pre-selling the niches so that there will be no cost to the church in building or maintaining the columbarium. Construction would commence only when enough niches have been purchased to provide adequate funds.

The Columbarium Committee members are Janice Gowland, Ellie Dunn, Jennifer Harrington, Bill Morris and Mother Pat, and I as the chairperson. Several members of our church have already expressed an interest in reserving niches. If there are any specific questions related to the columbarium or you are interested in reserving a niche, please feel free to ask any one of us. We will be keeping you informed of our progress on a regular basis.

Funday Sunday



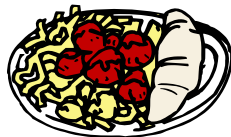

Results through August 2009

Total Income:

Here is a breakdown of our total income for 8 months into 2009:

Our envelope giving (both pledged and unpledged) is slightly ahead of target for 8 months of 2009. As our deficit grows at \$1,040 per month, we are working toward covering that deficit through a new deficit campaign.

Total expenses:

Here is a breakdown of our total expenses for 8 months into 2009.

Our expenses are also on target through August.

How are we doing so far?

We're doing well for the first eight months of 2009. Our income is steady for which we thank you for keeping your pledges current or exceeding them. Our expenses in total are right on target. Thanks to Mother Pat and Maryanne the office expenses are being trimmed, primarily through more efficient use of e-mailing, i.e. the Crook on-line and postage and paper savings. The Vestry is acting on trimming our fuel expenses by replacing the ancient oil furnace in the church with a more efficient gas burning system and at the same time restructuring our capital loan with lower payments. While the deficit is growing month by month, the new deficit campaign is being met with an outstanding enthusiasm. Through mid-Sept. we have received over \$10,000 towards our projected deficit of \$12,283. Thank you so much for your responses so far, and if we exceed our deficit for this year, we can always use it towards next year.

38 weeks into 2009

Through mid-September our income from envelopes (both pledged and unpledged) for 38 weeks: **\$139,155 actual vs. 136,155 estimated.**

With the Church School year now back in session and vacations over, another thank you goes out to all of you for keeping your pledges as current as possible so that we were able to maintain our cash flow throughout the summer.

Just a reminder that the 2009 Holly Fair is not that far away. On December 5th, the church parish hall, choir room, Sunday school rooms, and office wing will be transformed into a holiday bazaar with wonderful food, music, decorations, poinsettias, and lots of things for sale. Please read the Good Shepherd Table article for ideas on how you can help with our internal craft table. Also, keep your schedules clear for the 5th as we need lots of help to make the event a success. The first tenth (a tithe) of our proceeds go to local charities, with the next \$3,000 going towards our capital loan. There will be much more info coming out in the Sunday bulletins and the weekly tri-folds over the next month and a half.
